While I fully understand the need for energy efficiency and the rising costs of home heating due to global conflicts and climate change, the introduction of a rigid by-law could have unintended consequences for tenants and homeowners alike. There's a real risk that such regulations could:

- Increase the cost of living: Retrofitting older buildings to meet strict energy efficiency standards could raise costs for landlords, who may pass those costs onto tenants, leading to higher rents or forcing smaller property owners out of the market.
- Potentially create more homelessness: Any policy that increases housing costs or drives property owners to renovate unnecessarily could lead to renovictions, forcing tenants out and exacerbating the housing crisis.

Instead, I believe we should focus on new developments and ensure that all new buildings are constructed with high energy efficiency standards from the start, which most are due to building codes and regulations. This proactive approach ensures long-term sustainability without displacing current residents or driving up costs.

I also support targeted programs that offer energy efficiency support to low-income renters who may not have the financial flexibility to make housing choices, but I am cautious about any blanket policy that could have broad economic impacts. Sometimes, leaving older structures as they are avoids hidden issues and cost escalations that may emerge during renovations.

In short, while energy efficiency is important, I believe it's essential to balance it with housing affordability, preventing any negative ripple effects that could worsen the very problems we're trying to solve. This being said, most investors will purchase an older property with the intention of renovating. HRM could offer an incentive program to complete the necessary upgrades to meet reasonable standards for all. Allowing the market to continually correct itself. As in my plan, new policies will be set in place to also prevent renovictions.
