2026 Ecology Action Centre Board Nominations



Shawn Brayman completed a BSc in Computational Mathematics and a Master of Environmental Studies at York University. He founded a software firm specializing in personal financial planning that grew to serve users in more than 20 countries and multiple languages before being acquired by a NASDAQ-listed company in 2020.

For the last 15 years, Shawn has been an active researcher, earning several awards for his peer-reviewed work. He served as President of the Academy of Financial Services, a global academic membership association, in 2024–25 and continues to serve on its Board. Over the years, he has volunteered with numerous associations and foundations in Canada and the United States, receiving several honours, including the FP Canada Fellow Distinction.

After retiring in 2022, Shawn and his wife, Nancy, sailed their boat, *Stealing Summer*—named after a short story he wrote about global warming—to Halifax. They chose to make Nova Scotia home in 2024. Since then, Shawn has remained active in environmental and climate initiatives, advocating for building decarbonization and EV infrastructure as board member of The Roy in downtown Halifax. He believes individuals and organizations can align their values with their financial decisions to strengthen both financial and environmental outcomes.



Tony Charles became a budding environmentalist in high school, which led to volunteering with the environmental organization Pollution Probe in Ottawa in the 1970's. He then moved to Vancouver, becoming an active volunteer with the city's major environmental organization, SPEC (Society Promoting Environmental Conservation). When he then shifted to Halifax in the mid-1980s, Tony began a 40-year involvement with the EAC, working on a variety of projects and serving on the Board for a time, including as Co-Chair. He also became a longtime professor at Saint Mary's University, specializing in environmental science, business sustainability, and fisheries, oceans and coasts. Tony has a passion for supporting local communities in

their environmental conservation activities, especially through his role as Director of the Community Conservation Research Network (CCRN), a global network in which EAC has been an active partner. Alongside his work with communities, Tony works internationally with the International Union for the Conservation of Nature (IUCN) and the United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization, on a range of topics such as fisheries, oceans, climate change, biodiversity and food security. Meanwhile, around Halifax, Tony is a dedicated commuter cyclist.

Tania Cheng (she/they) is a strategy designer, change facilitator, and community builder who brings over 20 years of experience across the charitable and nonprofit sector as a leader, board member, volunteer, and consultant. Environmental Studies from the University of Waterloo. They bring 16 years of board experience, having served on the boards of Imagine Canada, Inside Out, and The Otesha Project.

After moving from Toronto to Tantallon in 2020, Tania co-founded St. Margaret's Bay Pride in 2024 to raise 2SLGBTQIA+ visibility and inclusion in her local community. When not working or building community, Tania enjoys playing and watching basketball, making ice cream, and spending time with their wife, toddler, and Yorkie.

Growing up in Nova Scotia's Annapolis Valley, Luke developed an early appreciation for the land through time spent working on local farms and raising animals. These experiences fostered a lifelong respect for the connection between healthy ecosystems, resilient communities, and sustainable livelihoods. His career later took him to Inuvik, Northwest Territories, where working alongside Inuvialuit organizations and communities deepened his appreciation for Indigenous knowledge, environmental stewardship, and the close relationship between people, culture, and the land. Throughout his career, Luke has worked closely with boards, executive leadership teams, and community stakeholders to advance financial sustainability, effective governance, and organizational governance. He and his wife, Rebecca, are raising their two children in Nova Scotia, where they enjoy spending time together outdoors.
